The registration fee is \$68 for the full ACT (without writing) test and \$93 for the full ACT (with writing) test. Students from low-income families may be eligible for an ACT fee waiver. In addition to the standard weekend testing dates, many states and districts offer in-school testing programs that give students the opportunity to take the ACT on paper or online in their classrooms on a weekday rather than on a Saturday. The registration fee involved for district testing is lower than that for national testing. For the full ACT (without writing) test and \$70.25 for the full ACT (with writing) test. For the online test, the fee is \$53.25 for the full ACT (without writing) test and \$68.50 for the full ACT (with writing) test. For those taking these courses in junior year, it's recommended to wait until late spring or early fall to start test prep. Advanced students who have completed these courses by junior year may want to consider sitting for a fall test date. However, exposure to trigonometry and statistics will also help with some of the more advanced questions featured in both exams. AP course-taking can be challenging during peak testing periods like May. Instead, targeting ACT test dates in September, October, or December of junior year can help avoid overwhelming prep work and exam-taking. The amount of study time needed varies from student. The introduction to each passage provides context, accompanied by terms explanations. In contrast, ACT Science features seven passages containing diagrams, tables, and other references. Questions may present dual perspectives from scientists, necessitating the evaluation of viewpoints and information. Ultimately, ACT Writing is an optional component, requiring students to compose a single-essay response to a given prompt, evaluated based on criteria such as ideas development, organisation, and language use.
